Your pension

Update on Bell's Pension Plan

The most recent actuarial valuation of the Bell Canada Pension Plan, as at December 31, 2023, showed a funding ratio and a solvency ratio over 115%¹.

This means the plan is sufficiently funded to cover all of its payments on an ongoing basis or if the plan would have been wound down as of December 31, 2023.

In accordance with pension legislation, the surplus position allows for the continuation of the contribution holiday for Bell Canada and its participating subsidiaries.

1. Funding ratio refers to the assets divided by liabilities on a going-concern basis. Solvency ratio refers to assets divided by liabilities as if the Plan had been terminated.

2024 pension audit in progress

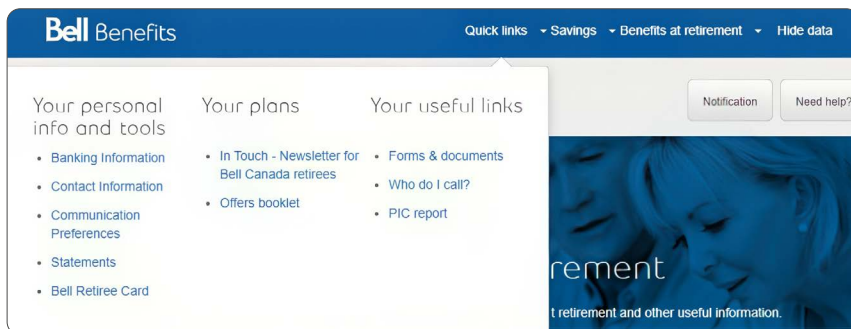
As part of good governance and to ensure pensioner records are up to date and accurate, Bell conducts annual pension audits. Retirees selected for this process are asked to validate their personal information by completing a pension audit form. Please note some retirees may receive audit requests in consecutive years.

If you received a letter or email as of April 24, 2024 requesting that you complete this audit, please respond as soon as possible by mail or by using the online Pensioner Audit Tool at bell.ca/mybenefits.

Retiree cards available on the Benefits site

To help you take advantage of discounts and offers with our participating retailers and business partners, a retiree ID card with your name, employee number, and retirement date is now available. Go to the Bell Benefits site bell.ca/mybenefits. Enter your Retiree ID and password. Select Bell retiree card from under the Quick links tab to print your card.

Submit your benefits claims online

Bell retirees can go paperless and use Manulife's secure online claims process, making benefit reimbursements faster and easier. If you're not already submitting claims online, the first time you access the site you'll be prompted to provide your email address and banking information. You may be asked to attach a photo of your receipt when submitting your claim.



Once your account is set up, notifications will be sent by email and your claim will be paid directly into your bank account within 1 to 5 business days.

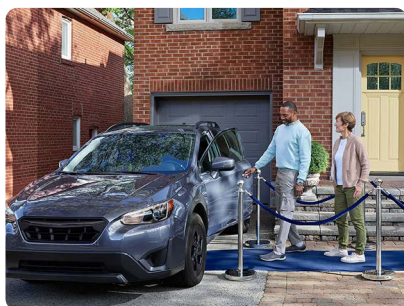

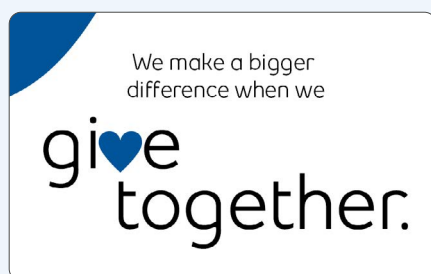

Beware of grandparent scams

Scammers are creative and their tactics are constantly changing. A grandparent scam or “emergency fraud” involves tricking you into believing that one of your grandchildren is in danger and forcing you to pay money to the scammer. Scammers contact you posing as a loved one in distress and needing money. They try to manipulate you by creating a sense of urgency and fear to make a rash decision.

Here’s what you can do to protect yourself:

- **Don’t trust the names and numbers on the display :** the display can be easily manipulated. If in doubt, **hang up** and call another known contact number.
- **Verify who the caller is:** ask the caller questions that only he or she can answer. Test them by presenting a false family situation and see how they react. A good practice for everyone is to have a code word or phrase known only to family members, which can be a way of verifying the person’s identity.
- **Check with family members:** hang up and contact parents or other family members and inform them of the situation. Inquire about the grandchild’s plans. Ignore the caller if they tell you not to tell anyone: this is a pressure tactic.

Retiree life

Jacqueline Caron: A Pioneer in Curling and the Community

Since she was young, Jacqueline Caron has been a real force in the curling world in Québec. It all began when she started at Bell as a telephone operator at the age of 20. It was there that she started curling with friends, and she took to it right away, while at the same time climbing the corporate ladder. The diligence and perseverance she developed at Bell served her well during her curling career.

In 1960, she helped establish Bell's first curling league in Québec, an initiative that sparked interest in the sport among her colleagues. The league still exists today, but only for retirees.

The Jackie Caron Tournament



In 1973, Jacqueline organized a women's tournament at the Jacques-Cartier Curling Club – a tournament that has borne her name since its inception more than 50 years ago. In 1979, she made history by becoming the first elected female president of the Jacques-Cartier Curling Club – a milestone in a traditionally male-dominated field.

In addition to these achievements, for more than 30 years, she has directed the

Québec International Bonspiel (QIB), a world-renowned men's tournament. Through her accomplishments, she became a leading figure for women in curling and paved the way for many other players.

When asked about the most significant event in her career, she remembered the year 1965, when her Québec team won the provincial championship. She mentioned that just before heading to the national tournament, the club was the victim of a hold-up. No one was hurt during the incident, but it caused quite a stir.

Although she wanted to participate in the Olympics, at the time when she played, curling was not yet considered an official Olympic sport. Curling subsequently made its debut at the games in 1998.

Curling Hall of Fame



In 2001, the Jacques-Cartier Curling Club honoured Jacqueline for her exceptional contribution and her many years of involvement in the sport by appointing her as a life member. This recognition

culminated with her induction into Curling Québec's Hall of Fame as a "Builder," at a very moving ceremony which took place earlier this year.

Now 88 years old, Jackie has put away her broom. As someone who dedicated her life to curling, creating a path for herself and influencing the community around her, she is proud of her legacy. Her commitment, dedication and passion have inspired generations of players, making her a true Québec curling legend.
